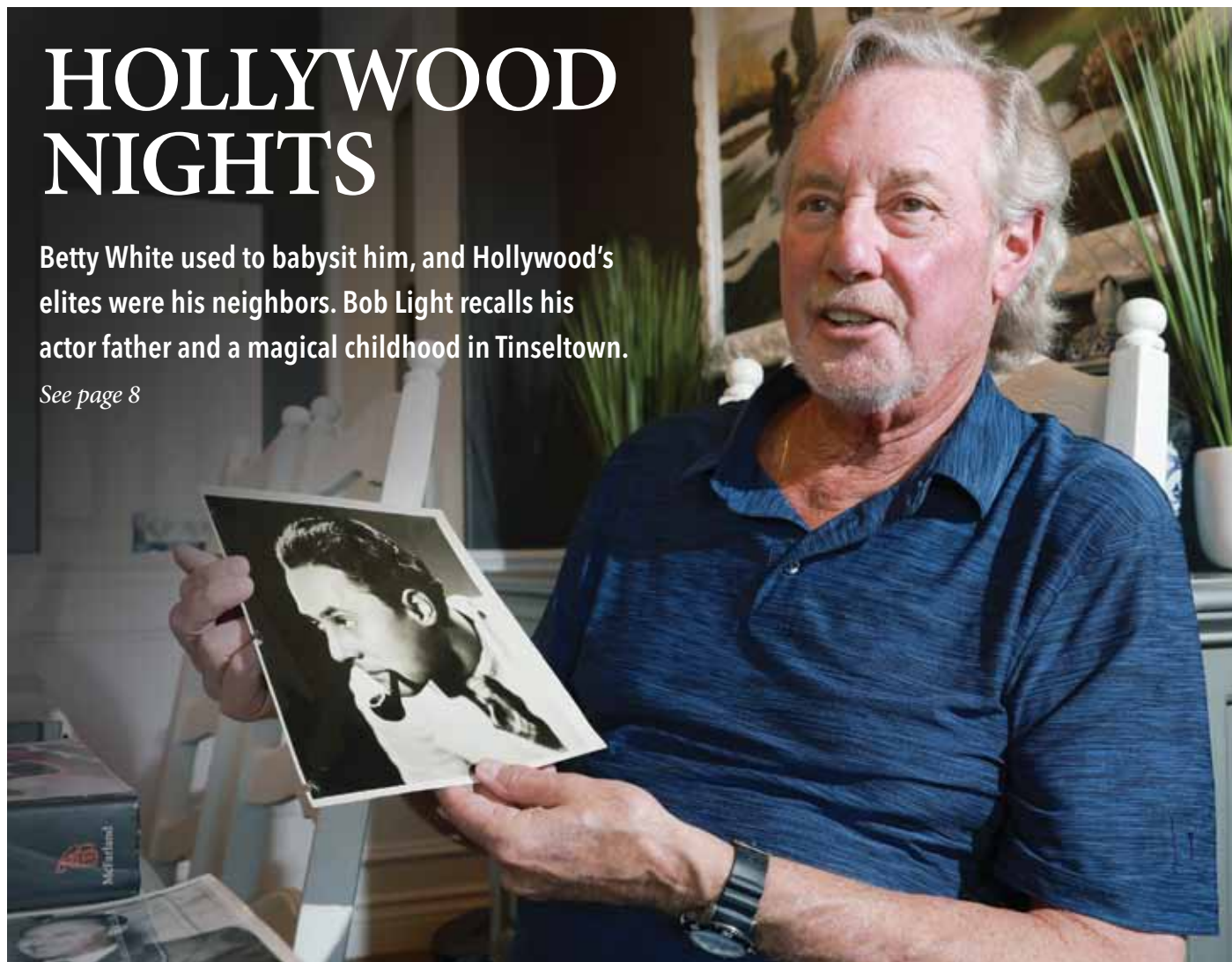

# SCS finishes fiscal year in black

Sun City Summerlin finished solidly in the black for the most recent fiscal year, beating estimates in its operating budget by a whopping \$1.57 million.

The black ink for the 2024-25 fiscal year for SCSCAI was largely due to improved performances at Sun City's three golf courses, which brought in more money than expected and spent less than projected to maintain the courses.

It was also boosted by a 20 percent HOA fee increase implemented in the 2024-25 fiscal year that allowed the SCSCAI to increase the operating budget by 21.6 percent for the year.

Where the \$1.5 million surplus (actually \$1.9 million since the budget originally called for a \$400,000 surplus) will end up won't be known until the audit for the fiscal year is concluded later this month and the Finance Committee and Board of Directors meet to decide where it

will go. The most likely use will be to fund reserves or new working capital for new projects in Sun City Summerlin.

But Board President Jeff Rorick says it portends well for future fiscal years in Sun City, where long term planning for the fiscal years through 2029 calls only for a 1.8 percent increase in HOA fees each year — though that number could change.

“That five year plan is in great shape based on what we know today,” Rorick said. “I think overall financially Sun City Summerlin is also in great shape.”

When board members approved the 2024-25 operating budget they included large increases for golf course maintenance and common area landscaping, partly because inflation prompted the association to increase starting wages from \$15 to \$20 an hour. There was also a 23.1 percent increase in the operating budget for the Tavern at the Falls and Summit restaurants.

But golf course maintenance ended up spending \$5.63 million instead of the \$6.01 million budgeted for the department for the fiscal year.

The three golf courses also took in more money than budgeted, \$6.02 million compared to the \$5.54 million amount that had been planned. Combined with a good performance by the golf pro shops they accounted for about \$1 million of the \$1.5 million black ink.

“Golf got us over the hump,” Rorick said. “They destroyed their revenue number thanks to dynamic pricing and good weather and did a good job conserving water, which is a big cost.”

Rorick said the pain of 20 percent HOA dues increases in two of the last four years and an 11 percent increase for the current year should be easing for residents. Based on projections, he said the HOA is on target to meet its plan of low single digit HOA increases in the next three years.

Sun City homeowners currently pay \$2,761.92 a year in HOA fees, which translates into a monthly payment of \$230.16.

The SCSCAI has benefitted by improved golf operations ever since the pandemic. A number of golf courses have closed in Las Vegas in

recent years, driving up public demand for the three courses in Sun City, where dynamic pricing is now used to increase revenue. About half the 113,832 rounds played last year in Sun City were by outside golfers.

The golf courses ran an operating deficit for the year of \$1.72 million, better than the budgeted \$2.73 million.

While the golf courses benefitted from an increased budget and favorable conditions, Sun City's two restaurants continue to struggle even with a 23.1 percent budget increase for the year.

The Tavern at the Falls and Summit restaurants were budgeted to lose \$1.03 million for the year and ended up about \$983,000 in the red despite an increase in revenue.

By comparison, the Fitness Department that runs Sun City's gyms cost residents \$831,664 for the year, less than the expected \$904,462. Administration was one of the few departments not to meet its budget, costing residents \$3.7 million, \$118,222 more than the budgeted amount.

The operating budget runs the SCSCAI and maintains the buildings and landscaping and other operations. It is separate from the reserve budget, which is currently underfunded but on track to reach a planned 70 percent level by the 2028-29 fiscal year. There was about \$21.6 million in reserves at the end of the fiscal year which, after accounting for money appropriated but not yet spent, is about 50 percent of the reserve balance goal.

The effect of the raise in NORA fees from about \$2,000 to \$5,000 for each new homeowner showed in the most recent fiscal year, with \$1.2 million in revenue on the sale of 571 homes compared to \$1.08 million for 584 homes a year earlier. That was despite the full NORA only going into effect the last few months of the fiscal year.

30. It's a snapshot of how Sun City Summerlin is doing that I believe is not only of interest to Sun City residents but those who might be thinking about buying a home here.

I'd say we're in a good place, but that's just me. There are certainly things you can complain about in the way SCSCAI collects and spends its money, and there's a small but vocal group of residents who spend a lot of time doing just that.

The last few years haven't been easy. Navigating out of COVID into a new world where things cost more and the infrastructure continues to age hasn't always been an easy path. My own HOA dues have gone up nearly \$100 since I moved here four years ago, and for some long term residents that hurts more than others.

The bad news is we've had two 20

percent rate hikes in the last four years, and one 11 percent one this year. The good news is the fiscal year ending report shows a surplus in the year ending June 30th of \$1.9 million – some \$1.5 million more than laid out in the original budget – and projected increases in future HOA dues are in the low single digits.

The question now is what do we do with the money left over from the latest budget?

Put it in the still underfunded reserves? Build an indoor pickleball center? Put a dome on the softball field (OK, you get the idea)?

Personally, I'd vote for sticking it all in the new capital fund for projects that will keep improving Sun City. But we have 12,000 residents here and you all may have different ideas.

My son, Eric, has a good eye for baseball talent, so when he told me

the Summerlin South Little League 12-year-old all-star team was good enough to get to the Little League World Series in Williamsport, I started paying attention early on.

The team was filled with big kids who could hit, said Eric, who edits SCS LIFE. Not only could they get to Williamsport but could make some noise once they got there.

# New Commissioner talks Sun City and other issues

In 2024, April Becker was elected to represent the Clark County Commission, District C. District C encompasses Sun City Summerlin along with Skye Canyon, North Summerlin, Northwest Las Vegas, Mt. Charleston, Kyle Canyon and Indian Springs.

As commissioner, she prioritizes an open-door policy for her constituents and is committed to advocating for a more transparent and accountable government.

Becker's commitment to serving others led her to volunteer at The Meadows School in various capacities, and in 2014, she was elected to the Board of Trustees.

She and her husband, Matt, have three children and are now proud grandparents. In her spare time, she enjoys fishing, hiking Red Rock and Mt. Charleston, engaging with the community, and spending time with her family.

**As your first time holding public office, how has it gone for you so far?**

It has been both energizing and humbling. I came in with a promise to take an open-door, nonpartisan approach, focusing on transparency, public safety, addressing homelessness with a strong mental health component, and cutting red tape for job creators. I am the first Republican on the board since 2009, but my guiding principle is service, not party.

**You had mentioned some issues in the transition from the previous commissioner. Has any of that been resolved?**

Early on, I discovered that nearly \$10 million of District C's budget was moved just before I took office. I raised the issue publicly, pushed for answers, and asked staff to bring forward guardrails so this kind of eleventh-hour shuffle cannot happen again. Conversations with the

county on accountability and best practices are still ongoing, and I will continue to press until we have clear policy and full transparency.

**What would you like to see in the district as you approach your second year in office?**

There are three priorities I would like to see progress on. First, measurable improvements in homelessness services that emphasize treatment and outcomes. Second, faster and more predictable licensing so small businesses can open and hire without unnecessary delays. Third, visible neighborhood improvements such as traffic safety, parks and trails delivered on time and within budget, especially given the county's budget pressures this year.

**What specific issues or plans relate to Sun City Summerlin?**

Although these two projects were approved long before my term began, two major projects come to mind. The first is the CC-215 and Summerlin Parkway interchange rebuild, which is a multi-year project that includes new ramps, bridges, and three trail bridges. The second is linked trail and sidewalk upgrades along Summerlin Parkway. I am monitoring the construction schedule closely so we can minimize detours and keep residents informed, and I am advocating for the new trail connections to be designed with safe, senior-friendly access in mind.

# After falls, SCS performers reach The Summit of their careers

**W**hat had originally been planned as a temporary relocation to avoid construction dust turned into a showbiz success story.

Until this summer, Thursday nights meant Tavern at the Falls, where a cadre of regular SCS-based entertainers squeezed in for performances that kept the place rocking until 9 p.m. As part of a major remodeling, the Tavern is gaining bar-top gaming and a “classier elevated look” that leaves no room for a stage, said Marvin Calorera, director of food and beverage for the Sun City Summerlin Community Association.

But in a plot twist worthy of Hollywood, the decision was shaped in part by the strong fan support for moving shows to The Summit — a venue designed with live entertainment in mind.

“All the shows are doing really well due to the fact that you can capture all the audience in one room,” Marvin said, adding that he will introduce a new Summit food menu at the end of September, about the same time Tavern at the Falls is expected to reopen.

And SCS residents can toast all of the progress at a wine tasting set for The Summit on Sept. 26.

# Memories of Tinseltown: Bob Light recalls growing up among Hollywood Stars

You can forgive Bob Light for having no recollection of the woman bouncing him on her knee when he was a toddler. After all, he was only 3 years old, and she was years away from becoming one of the most beloved and lasting figures on television.

“Well, I don’t remember her very well at all, other than meeting her twice as an adult,” Light said of Betty White, who, at the time, was engaged to his father. “She remembered me as little Robbie sitting on her knee, because when she’d be at the house, she’d help take care of me.”

The engagement didn’t last, but White was hardly the only celebrity that Light came in contact with through the years. As a teenager in the San Fernando Valley, neighbors included Lou Costello, William Conrad and Yvonne DeCarlo. Barbara Eden and her husband, actor Michael Ansara, came to play bridge, and Lorne Greene was a frequent guest. Mickey Dolenz of the Monkees was a year ahead of him in high school, while Tom Selleck was two years older.

Bob Light’s father, Robert M. Light, was a movie actor during the Golden Age of Hollywood and later became a radio personality during World War II.

“To this day, my father is the most admired person I have ever known,” the younger Light said of the man who

passed away in 1997.

Robert Light was born in Denver and raised in New York City. He left home as a teenager and started acting on Broadway. In 1928, he was discovered on stage and brought to Los Angeles by Warner Brothers. He was set up in an apartment in the Biltmore Hotel, along with another actor, Errol Flynn.

He acted in 11 films for Warner Brothers, MGM and Universal studios and appeared with such stars as William Powell, Jean Harlow, James Cagney and Carole Lombard.

Light said his father really didn’t enjoy acting in the films but did enjoy the unlimited budget he received from the studios to wine and dine starlets of the era.

“They would give him money to take the starlets out to be seen in public,” Light said. “He’d always have these

different famous stars that he’d be taking out to dinner and going to nightclubs.”

His father told him, “I’d play tennis most of the day, take starlets out at night on an expense account, and do an occasional film. It was a pretty good gig.”

His last film, “My Man Godfrey,” was in 1936 and later that year he starred in NBC’s first 30-minute dramatic television show, which led to a three-day-a-week soap opera that he wrote and starred in with his first wife, Dorris Donaldson.

In 1940, Robert Light became a successful radio show writer and producer with a twice-a-week variety show called “One of the Finest.”

During that time, “a comedy duo showed up late, nothing in writing, and my dad did not want to introduce them,” Bob Light said. “At the insistence of his

staff as to their talent, (Bud) Abbot and (Lou) Costello performed ‘Who’s on First’ without missing a beat.”

At the start of World War II, Robert Light joined the Army, producing radio shows to sell war bonds — once pairing with Bette Davis. He was then assigned to the Signal Corps as public relations officer at the Pentagon, before being transferred to London.

After a couple of months, he was assigned to the Armed Forces Network to provide information and entertainment to GIs in Europe. American and English screen and radio stars, who donated time and effort to the war, would often go on the air when they were in London. Bing Crosby taped a Christmas show — entirely in German. Big Band leader Glenn Miller confided in Robert Light that he was

nervous about crossing the English Channel with one of the fighter pilots. He was never seen again.

Among the celebrities the elder Light got to know were Bob Hope, Edward R. Murrow, Susan Hayward, Rita Hayworth, Marlene Dietrich, Edward G. Robinson, Ernie Pile and Dinah Shore, who he described as “one of the most talented and gracious ladies I have ever met.”

In addition to the celebrities, Robert Light met a dancer named Peggy Dodgson who performed at USOs in Britain. The pair fell in love and married in London in 1943.

In 1945, Robert Light was appointed director of programming for Armed Forces Radio Hollywood and moved his family to Los Angeles. The following year, he was honorably discharged from

the Army as a lieutenant colonel and received the Bronze Star for his service.

Bob Light's parents divorced in 1948 soon after his birth, and his mother returned to England. He remembers being put on a plane to Los Angeles with a note on his jacket to spend the Christmas holidays and the summer with his father. It was during one of those trips that Bob met Betty White.

Robert Light and White were together for about two years before his father called off the engagement. "She was a shrewd businesswoman. She was very strong and forceful," Bob Light said. "My dad was pretty easy-going, and I don't think he liked that."

On the other side of the ocean, his mother married an Air Force doctor who moved the family back to the states in 1957. She died when Bob Light was 14 years old, and he went to live with his father.

At the time, Robert Light was the director of promotion and advertising for RKO General Broadcasting's Western Division. He left that in 1958 to produce a television show for CBS called "Quiz Down." In 1959, he was named president of the Southern California Broadcasters Association, where he remained until his retirement.

Bob Light, in the meantime, graduated from high school in 1965. "Against my dad's wishes, I was offered a job as an apprentice film editor at 20th Century Fox, and that's where I went." He ended up as an assistant film editor working for Fess Parker on "Daniel Boone."

In 1967, Bob Light was drafted into the Vietnam War; he called his father and told him he was heading to basic training to be a helicopter door gunner.

"The next morning, I get a call from the first sergeant's office saying, 'I don't know who you know, but you've already been reassigned.'"

He was sent to Germany, where he was told, "We know who your father was, and we know that he was the founder of AFN, so you're going to

do the same thing." He was handed a microphone and did news and talk radio in Germany for two years.

When he got out of the service, he went back to 20th Century Fox, but that didn't last long as the company was in the process of bankruptcy.

Bob Light started working at the Hilton in Los Angeles. "They hired me to do audio visual work, since I had some background in radio, so I was working in the sound department in the hotel. Eventually I ended up getting into sales, marketing, conventions, meeting, planning, and spent 40 years in the hotel industry."

In 1986, he began working with a friend whose company sold rooms in Las Vegas out of a call center in Los Angeles. The joint endeavor became a large .com reservation company with Bob Light as president.

After the Northridge earthquake in 1994, Bob Light decided to move the office and his family to Las Vegas. They chose Las Vegas because his biggest business was here, and his wife's mother was already living in Sun City.

"My only mistake was I never went public," he said of the company.

Bob Light started selling contracts to some friends who were trying to get into the Las Vegas market. His friends' company, Hotels.com, began to grow quite rapidly.

"Then they ended up taking it public and became Expedia," he said. "They got so big that they could get their own contracts and were not using mine anymore."

Light shut down his business in 2008 during the Great Recession. With his children grown and gone, he put his 4,000-square-foot house on TPC Summerlin on the market.

"It took us two years to sell, but we finally moved to Sun City Summerlin, and we just love it here," Bob Light said. "The first thing I did was join the softball league. This is my 16th season of playing."

"I'm in two leagues now. I'm in the Sun City league here," he continued. "and I was drafted this year onto a travel team of 80-year-olds because I'm 78 and they allow 78-year-olds to play in the league."

# 30 Years Ago: Second Sun City in Las Vegas planned after success in Summerlin

## 30 YEARS AGO

• The success of Sun City Summerlin has prompted developer Del Webb Corp. to build a new Sun City in the Las Vegas Valley. The second Sun City is at McDonald Ranch and at buildout will be home to 5,000 residents. Meanwhile, Sun City Summerlin is adding a third golf course to the community and still selling new homes, expanding to the south side of Lake Mead Boulevard.

• An 1,804 square foot home with double fairway and mountain views was listed at \$259,900.

## 25 YEARS AGO

• The debate over a planned freeway interchange at Lake Mead Boulevard continues with opponents claiming the street is ill-equipped to handle increased traffic because of minimal lanes and blind curves. There is also debate about whether purchasers of Sun City property were ever notified that a proposed beltway would skirt the community. Proponents say any interchange is years away and will help Sun City residents get around town easier.

• Sun City is looking for servers and cooks at the Summit Restaurant.

Among the perks offered is free golf.

• A 3-bedroom home on the golf course with Strip views from the living room was listed at \$485,000

## 20 YEARS AGO

• The popular Sun City Summerlin fall garage sale will not be held this year because of resident complaints about parking and traffic. The sale was held at the Mountain Shadows Community Center until 2002 when it was moved to the Pinnacle center and later to the parking lot of the Suncoast casino. Though labeled as a garage sale, residents had to bring items to the community centers to sell since Sun City forbids garage sales.

• A 2,210 square foot home with city and golf views on Highland Falls DR was listed at \$729,900.

## 15 YEARS AGO

• In the middle of a recession, Sun City's three golf courses are trying to lure outside golfers. Director of Golf Joe Kelly said many people think the courses are private so don't consider them for play. Kelly said Highland Falls especially is a hidden secret and a great value with discounts because of current economic conditions.

• Hungry Las Vegans are welcomed at the Chev's Pantry Cafe at The Summit in Sun City Summerlin, where home cooked dishes are prepared daily. The restaurant not only serves the retirement community but anyone who wants to get a bite for lunch or dinner during the week. Entrees include oven-roasted chicken with mashed potatoes, pork chops, kielbasa and sauerkraut as well as a variety of salads.

• A 2 bedroom townhome on the golf course was advertised for \$159,900.

## 10 YEARS AGO

• Palm Valley's new cart paths will be reopened with a fitness walk for residents followed by golf when the September overseeding is complete. The 25-year-old asphalt paths were replaced with concrete in a summer project at a cost of \$1.1 million.

## 5 YEARS AGO

• A dispute over trees blocking views of residents on Sierra Heights St. was tabled after the Community Standards department said they didn't constitute a nuisance to homeowners. Residents of a subassociation of duplexes on the street just east of Sierra Heights had the trees trimmed previously to allow views but said they no longer wanted to do that. The issue remained unresolved.

• The outdoor pool at Mountain Shadows will be kept open until Nov. 15 this year after a survey showed residents would use the pool even on colder days. The pool season will be extended as part of a trial and could be open the entire month of November should it work out. The cost of heating the pool an extra month was estimated at about \$8,000.

• Plans are underway to develop a comprehensive five-year marketing

plan for Sun City's golf courses and restaurants.

## 3 YEARS AGO

• Executive Director Mitzi Mills is getting a \$15,000 bonus for her work the past two years managing pandemic issues in Sun City. Mills will also get retroactive pay of \$19,998 for forgoing a wage increase during the pandemic, the only employee to do so. The bonus and salary adjustment passed on a 7-2 vote by the Board of Directors, increasing her current salary to \$233,398.

• Sun City's three community centers will soon have hitching posts in the parking lot - but not for horses. The posts will be installed for golf carts after complaints by golf cart owners that their carts are not safe in the parking lots. Total cost for the installation will be about \$11,000.

## 1 YEAR AGO

• The initial vote for an increase in the NORA fee paid by new homeowners did not garner enough YES votes to pass, prompting the Board of Directors to extend the vote until the end of October. The initial vote count showed 3,552 votes in favor of the increase to \$5,000 and 527 votes against. The measure needs two thirds approval of Sun City homeowners, or a total of 5,214 YES votes. The increase of about \$3,000 per home sale would go to fund the SC-SCAI reserves.

• Sun City is looking for input from residents for putting cameras that read license plates in the community. The proposal by Flock Camera Systems calls for 24 cameras to be placed in the community's 12 points of entry. The information from the cameras would only be available to Metro Police for help in tracking down criminals.

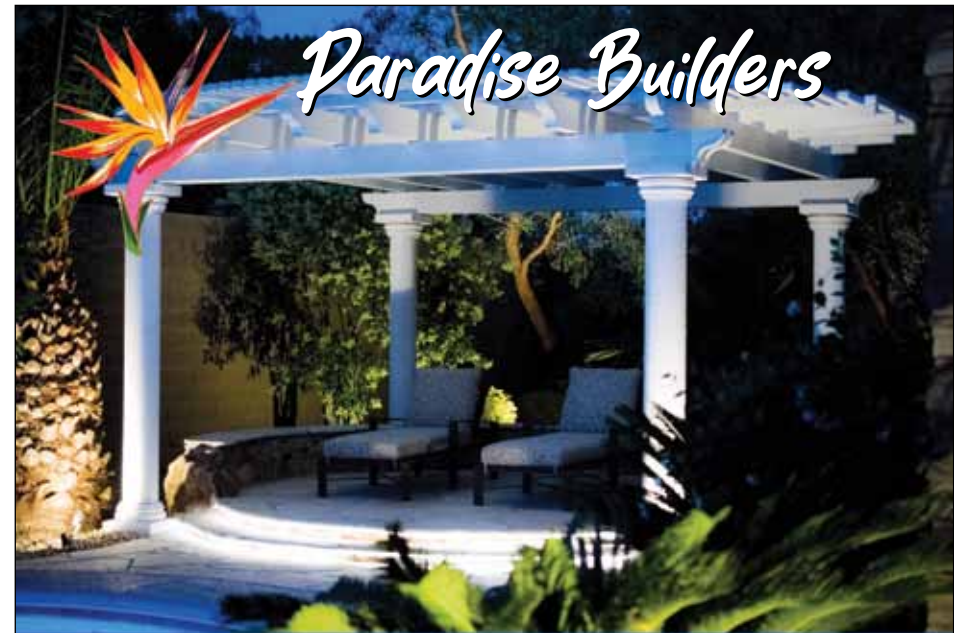

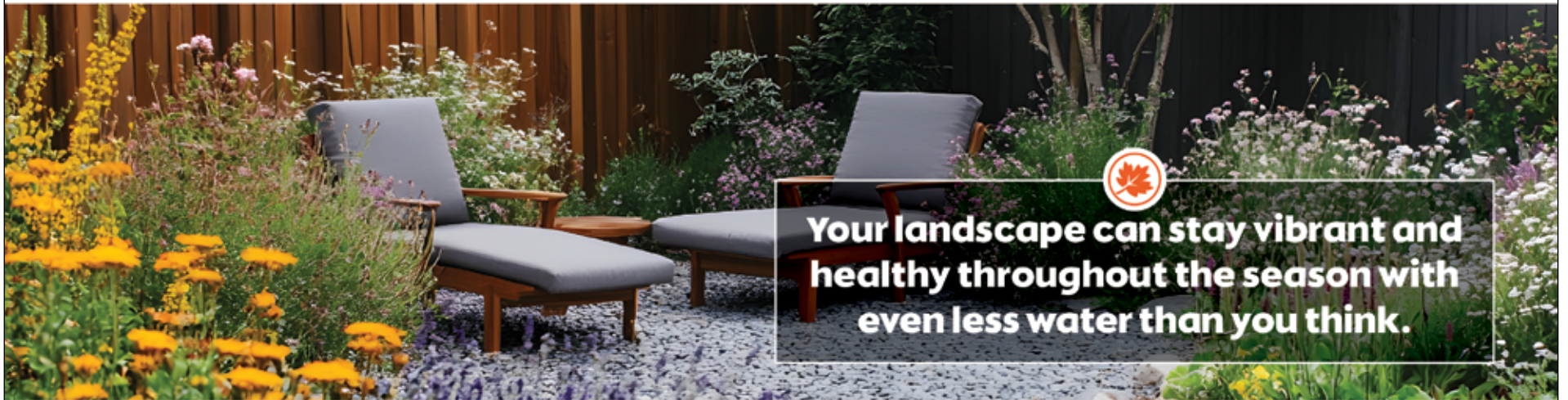

# SAVING WATER IN THE FALL: A COOL THING TO DO



As another sweltering hot Southern Nevada summer comes to an end, you're no doubt ready to welcome the cooler and more pleasant days and nights of fall. And with the change of seasons comes a valuable opportunity for you to save water—and manage your monthly bills—by changing your watering clock to follow the community's mandatory fall seasonal watering schedule.



**Your landscape can stay vibrant and healthy throughout the season with even less water than you think.**

**From Sept. 1 through Oct. 31, the fall watering restrictions limit landscape irrigation to three assigned days per week.**

Watering outside of your assigned watering days can result in costly water-waste fines, and remember—watering is prohibited on Sunday. **Find your assigned watering days at [snwa.com](http://snwa.com).**

Plants and trees need much less water than grass. You can help boost conservation this fall by watering drip-irrigated plants and trees on a recommended two-

day-a-week schedule. Duration is based on the flow rate of your emitters. Meanwhile, grass should be watered **ONLY** three days a week. This may not sound like a lot, but keep in mind that temperatures are getting cooler—which means higher soil moisture to help your landscape stay vibrant and healthy with less water.

To keep your landscape lush and happy, and save water while you're at it, remember this simple five-word tip: Drip It, Don't Drown It!

If you have a grass landscape, continue running your spray irrigation systems during the early

morning hours through October to help minimize water lost to evaporation. Avoid watering on windy or rainy days, and inspect and test your system on a regular basis to prevent overspray onto sidewalks and streets—which could result in a water-waste fee. And nobody wants that!

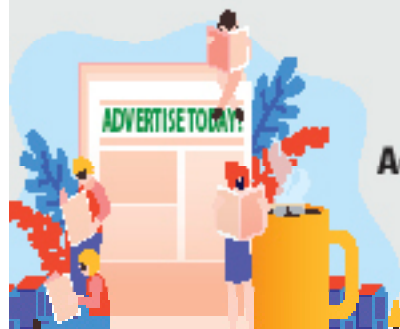

**W**ith the Las Vegas tourism swoon so much in the news these days, my social media accounts have been peppered with pleas from various casinos touting their “reasonable” prices.

Cheap rooms, food, and entertainment. No resort fees, parking fees, and random upcharges.

This ad crossed my phone from South Point.



It touts its Graveyard Specials, including a 7 oz New York Strip Steak, two eggs, hash browns, and toast for a mere \$7.45.

Don't get me wrong, that's a fair price these days, and if I were bumping around the South Coast at midnight, I'd be tempted. However, at the risk of sounding any more like the curmudgeon I have become, I remember Las Vegas when these kinds of deals were legit deals.

In the 1970s, Downtown casinos offered free hot dogs and 25-cent shrimp cocktails, 24-7. I remember 49-cent breakfast deals all morning long. Even into the first 20 years of this century, you could find \$1.99 deals at most casino coffee shops.

# America... There is a new Medicare scam!

### Dear Toni:

I recently had a hospice agent knocking on the doors in my neighborhood who said he represented Medicare. He was giving away free hospice gifts and told me that I could receive these Medicare services at no charge for me and my husband. I told him that I do not give out personal information to anyone that I did not know because I remember attending your Confused About Medicare workshop in Katy and you said not to give anyone your Medicare or Social Security information when someone contacts you in person, by phone or email.

Now, I'm concerned that I could have made a mistake. Should I call and ask if this Medicare service is still available? Thanks, Toni.

### Hi Deidre:

Don't stress yourself out, because Medicare is not giving away anything free! This is a new Medicare scam that is targeting America's Medicare population. Last week, Dr. Mehmet Oz, the administrator for the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, emailed an article with a YouTube video to Americans enrolled in Medicare titled, "Never sign anything in exchange for 'free' services—it's a scam!" You can view the Medicare.gov YouTube video at [www.youtube.com/shorts/moygedIGFiY](https://www.youtube.com/shorts/moygedIGFiY).

In the email from Medicare.gov, it says... "Note: Hospice care is for people who are terminally ill and is a

serious decision made only between you and your doctor." If you think that you have experienced "fraud," call 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227) and report your fraud issue to the Medicare agent who answers your call.

Medicare, Social Security and also the IRS will NEVER randomly call your home or cell phone and ask for your personal or banking information. In almost every case, Medicare already has all the information they need about you. If information is needed, a letter will be sent directing you to the specific government agency you need and telling you to contact them for additional information.

Additional help for Medicare fraud is available at Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP), which helps those on Medicare learn how to detect fraud and abuse. To report Medicare Fraud or Abuse call the nationwide SMP toll-free number 877-808-2468 or visit the SMP website at [www.smpresource.org](http://www.smpresource.org) to locate the closest SMP office in the state where you live.

The SMP website discusses common Medicare Fraud Schemes such as genetic testing, hospice, Medicare card scams, and the list goes on. Below are a few tips to help protect you against Medicare fraud:

- Have a safety script by your phone or front door for solicitors. Tell anyone, especially scammers, you do not give out personal information to anyone who calls or knocks on your front door. (Get your kids or a friend to help you write your script.) Stick to the script no matter what

- Never give your Medicare or

# How to prevent falls at home

## Dear Savvy Senior,

My 80-year-old father, who lives alone, has fallen several times over the past few months. Are there any tips or precautions you recommend that I can implement to help prevent this?

### Concerned Son

## Dear Concerned,

This is a common concern for millions of elderly seniors and their families. Each year more than 1-in-4 older Americans fall, making it the leading cause of both fatal and non-fatal injuries for those age 65 and older. But many falls can be prevented. Depending on what's causing your dad to fall, here are some tips that can help keep him on his feet.

Get him exercising: Weak leg muscles and poor balance are two of the biggest risk factors that cause seniors to fall. Walking, strength training and tai chi are all good for improving balance and strength, as are a number of simple exercises your dad can do anytime like sit-to-stand exercises (sitting down and standing up from a seat without using his hands for assistance), standing on one foot for 30 seconds then switching to the other foot, and walking heel-to-toe across the room.

Check his meds: Does your dad take any medicine, or combination of medicines, that make him dizzy, sleepy or lightheaded? If so, make a list or gather

up all the drugs he takes – prescriptions and over the counter – and contact his doctor or pharmacist for a drug review and adjustment.

Many blood pressure medications, anti-anxiety drugs, antidepressants, anti-seizure drugs, anti-psychotic drugs, diuretics, sedatives, tranquilizers, some painkillers and over-the-counter drugs that cause drowsiness are common culprits in medication-related falls.

Get a vision and hearing test: Even small changes in sight and hearing can increase your dad's risk of falling, so get his eyes checked every year to be sure his vision and eyeglasses (if used) are up to par. Hearing loss can also double the risk of falling, so have your dad's hearing checked too, and if he uses a hearing aid, be sure it fits well, and



he wears it.

Fall-proof his home: There are a number of simple household modifications you can do to make your dad's living area safer. Start by helping him arrange or move the furniture so there are clear pathways to walk through and pick-up items on the floor that could cause him to trip like newspapers, shoes, clothes, electrical or phone cords.

If he has throw rugs, remove them or use double-sided tape to secure them.

In the bathroom buy some non-skid rugs for the floors and a rubber suction-grip mat or adhesive non-skid tape for the floor of the tub or shower, and have a carpenter install grab bars in and around the tub/shower for support.

Also, make sure the lighting throughout the house is good. Purchase some inexpensive plug-in nightlights for the bathrooms and

hallways, and if he has stairs, put handrails on both sides.

Choose safe footwear: Going barefoot or wearing slippers or socks at home can also cause falls, as can wearing backless shoes, and shoes with heels or smooth leather soles. The safest option is rubber-sole, low-heel shoes.

Purchase some helpful aids: If your dad needs some help with his balance or walking, get him a cane or walker. Also, to help ensure your dad's safety, and provide you some peace of mind, consider getting him a medical alert system that comes with a wearable emergency help button (some systems are voice-activated) that would allow him to call for help if he did fall or need assistance.

# August home sales see drastic plunge in Sun City

Home sales plunged in August in Sun City Summerlin, though contracts for upcoming sales offered some reason for optimism in the real estate market.

Just 23 home sales closed in SCS in August, down from 49 a month earlier. Inventory remained high, with 191 homes for sale in the community.

Homes sold in August ranged from a 1,046 square foot Bristol model townhouse at 8560 Desert Holly Dr for \$300,000 to \$700,000 for a 2,102 square foot Sherwood model single

family at 2275 Youngdale Dr.

There were 191 homes for sale in Sun City Summerlin on September 1, with 25 on the golf course, ranging from \$335,000 to \$1,595,000 and 12 with a strip view, ranging from \$379,000 to \$1,729,000.

While actual sales were down sharply in August, the number of listings under contract jumped. As of Sept. 1 there were 51 homes under contract compared to 22 a month earlier.

Cash sales remain popular, with 57 percent of sales over the last 12 months paid in cash.

### BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING GETS HEATED

Was it peppers and oranges being mixed, or was it oranges and apples? That was the burning question at the Sept. 9 Board of Directors meeting, where former board member Steve Commander spoke during the public session to accuse Executive Director Mitzi Mills of mixing “peppers and oranges” in allegedly referring to him in one of her weekly Chat with Mitzi calls.

It wasn’t resolved but in the end Commander’s microphone was cut off after his allotted 3-minute time before the board ended.

“You can actually go sit down, because I’m just addressing it to the board,” Mills told Commander in her response. “I’m addressing the part about him saying I’m mixing oranges and apples or something.”

The flareup, during which Commander called for Mills to resign along with the rest of the board, centered on an Aug. 29 Chat With Mitzi call where she talked about a local television segment that made it appear Sun City’s finances were in dire trouble. Mills said that kind of news, which she said was false, could lead to property values going down because people would be reluctant to buy homes in Sun City.

Commander indicated he thought Mills was referring to an article he had written for another publication that said Sun City was \$27 million in debt but Mills said she was specifically referring to the television news story, which prompted the board to hire a public relations firm to market Sun City.

“Why Mr. Commander thinks I was talking about him, or an article he wrote ages ago, I have no idea,” Mills said. “But he is the one mixing apples and oranges.”

Commander served a three-year term on the board that ended last year during which he had a contentious relationship with fellow board members.

### NUMBER OF GOLF ROUNDS SKYROCKET

Golf rounds increased in the latest fiscal year, with Sun City’s three courses hosting a total of 113,832 rounds. That was up 1,300 over last year’s total.

Golf revenue also increased from the previous year ending June 30. The golf courses took in \$6.02 million, compared to \$5.68 million the 2023-24 fiscal year.
